Mohan, Ace Mgedeza, Blessing "Killer" Mgidi and many others. Every African country boasts of similar soccer heroes, legends and experiences.

Programme Director, please allow me to indicate that the peoples of Africa are welcoming the FIFA Family and all the world that is descending on our shores.

I would also like to take this opportunity, although my heart is with Bafana Bafana, to wish all the teams well in their endeavours – and – may the best team win.
