I am proud to be standing before the City of Johannesburg's graduands who have made us proud by achieving their certificates in Local Governance and Oversight Programme.

Education is a crucial tool of liberation. Our stalwarts and leaders of the African National Congress including Oliver Tambo, Nelson Mandela, Govan Mbeki and many others took decisive steps to act against the apartheid regime when the Bantu Education Act was decreed in 1953. "The fight against Bantu Education must go on.
